- <u>God's Big Plan</u> by Elizabeth Caldwell and Theodore Hiebert (Flyaway), the story of Babel reveals God's plan for diversity and it comes in a board book for pre-readers: <u>God's Big Plan the Board Book</u> (Flyaway)
- <u>I Am Brave: A Little Book about Martin Luther King, Jr</u>. by Brad Meltzer (Dial/Penguin)
- When Harriet Met Sojourner by Catherine Clinton; illustrated by Shane Evans
- We March and many others by Shane W. Evans
- Paths to Peace: People Who Changed the World by Jane Breskin Zalben includes one-page biographies of sixteen important figures;
- <u>Ten Amazing People and How They Changed the World</u> by Maura D. Shaw; illustrated by Stephen Marchesi "shows kids that spiritual people can have an exciting impact on the world around them"
- <u>A Different Pond</u> by Bao Phi; illustrated by Thi Bui gently talks about "family, migration and memory"
- Affirm youngsters in their "diversity of races and ethnicities, physical features, body types, abilities and disabilities" with *I Love Me!* (Beaming)
- <u>Me and My Sister</u> by Rose Robbins, a book for "siblings of all backgrounds... about embracing difference"
- For ages 3-7, Sandy Eisenberg Sasso's <u>The Story of AND</u> (Flyaway) has a companion <u>song by Carrie Newcomer</u>
- <u>Brian the Brave</u> by Paul Stewart and Jane Porter invites conversations about "friendship, teamwork, and bias based on race or language".
- <u>Accordionly: Abuela and Opa Make Music</u> shares tips from the author's own experience growing up in a multicultural household.
- For Beautiful Black Boys Who Believe in a Better World (Michael W. Waters; releasing 09.15.20); an online <u>Discussion and Activity Guide (PDF)</u> is available now.
- <u>Crocodile's Crossing: A Search for Home</u> by Yori Sieger looks at immigration and where we find home.

- Who Is My Neighbor? By Amy-Jill Levine & Sandy Eisenberg Sasso (based on the parable of the Good Samaritan) considers why we avoid caring for those who don't look like us and how things can change when we do.
- <u>God's Dream</u> by Archbishop Desmond Tutu and Douglas Carlton Abrams; illustrated by LeUyen Pham beckons readers to contemplate the joy of living compassionately within diversity
- Love by Matt de la Pena; illustrated by Loren Long simple and rich
- <u>Beautiful Moon: A Child's Prayer</u> by Tonya Bolden; illustrated by Eric Velasquez beautifully illustrates the need for prayer, compassion for others, and the diversity of a city at night
